Name Jesus as God’s Son. c. Name the Holy Spirit as our helper. 2. Recognize God (Father, Son and Holy Spirit) is Creator of all things (CCC 316). 3. Know that God’s very being is truth and love. 4. Recognize the beauty of God’s love through all that He made. 5. Know that we belong to God’s family, the Church. 6. Recognize that the Creed is a statement of our faith. 7. Understand that Jesus died to give us new life. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 8. Recite and make the Sign of the Cross. 9. Name the three persons of the Trinity and relate it to the Sign of the Cross. 10. Explain the role of each of the three persons in one God. 11. Illustrate the three persons of the Trinity using drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u><i>Life Application: Students will</i></u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Attend Mass with family and pray the Nicene Creed along with assembly. • Share with family their understanding of God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. 	<p><u><i>Knowledge: Students will</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know that God’s very being is truth and is love: all present, all knowing and eternal. 2. Recognize the Creed as a statement of our beliefs as Catholics. 3. Recognize that both the Apostles’ Creed and the Nicene Creed are statements of our faith. 4. Know the terms and understand the outline of the Creed (CCC 184 ff): one God: Father, Son, Holy Spirit; Church. 5. Break down the Creed to understand each part. 6. Identify our Catholic beliefs as stated in the Creed – from Creation to Life Everlasting. 7. Recognize the Nicene Creed as an important part of the Mass and of our Christian life. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 8. Recite the Apostles’ Creed from memory. 9. Recite the Nicene Creed with others. 10. Illustrate beliefs using drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u><i>Life Application: Students will</i></u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Attend Mass with family and pray the Nicene Creed along with assembly. • Share with family their understanding of God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. • Paraphrase Creed with family. 	<p><u><i>Knowledge: Students will</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know that God’s very being is truth and is love: all present, all knowing and eternal. 2. Recognize that the key points of both Creeds (Apostles’ Creed and Nicene Creed) are Trinitarian – one God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. 3. Understand the historical origin of the two Creeds from Scripture and from Tradition. 4. Recognize the Marks of the Church as one, holy, catholic and apostolic. 5. Recognize the twelve articles of faith as stated in the Apostles’ Creed: 1) I believe in God the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and earth, 2) I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, 3) He was conceived by the Holy Spirit, and born of the Virgin Mary 4) Jesus Christ suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and buried, 5) He descended into hell and on the third day He rose 6) He ascended into Heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father 7) He will come again to judge the living and the dead 8) I believe in the Holy Spirit, 9) the Holy Catholic Church 10) the forgiveness of sins, 11) the resurrection of the Body, 12) and in life everlasting. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 6. Recite the Apostles’ Creed and the Nicene Creed. 7. Explain the truths identified in the Apostles’ Creed. 8. Explain how the Marks of the Church are evident in the world today. 9. Tell how the beliefs of the Catholic Church are reflected in their daily life. 10. Outcome (Being): Students will become persons who appreciate the teachings of the Church, leading to a profound sense of the mystery of salvation. (RCIA, 75)

As a result of their faith formation ...

<p><u><i>Knowledge: Students will</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know that the Bible has two parts (Old and New Testaments). 2. Know that the life of Jesus is found in the Bible. 3. Know the stories of the Annunciation and of the birth of Jesus. 4. Be familiar with the story of the Death and of the Resurrection of Jesus. 5. Be familiar with particular stories, parables and miracles of Jesus; for example they need to recognize the concepts of the Prodigal Son, Good Samaritan, Zaccheus, Lost Sheep, loaves and fishes, healing of the man born blind, Last Supper, Raising of Lazarus, etc. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 6. Retell Bible Stories in their own words. 7. Relate particular Bible Stories to Baptism, to Reconciliation, to Eucharist, and to their lives. 8. Listen to or view selections from children’s literature that further illustrate the Gospel Stories. 9. Illustrate the life of Jesus using drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u><i>Life Application: Students will</i></u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Be attentive to Gospel at Sunday Mass. • Talk about Bible Stories, including Sunday Gospel, with their family. 	<p><u><i>Knowledge: Students will</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Recognize Jesus in the Gospel and how Jesus’ life applies to their lives. 2. Be familiar with the life and the teachings of Jesus as told in Scripture. 3. Know life of Jesus through Church year, traditions, devotions (Rosary, Stations of the Cross, etc.), and prayers. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 4. Tell the story of Jesus’ Life. 5. Connect Bible Stories to their personal experiences. 6. Identify the value expressed in the Gospel Stories and tell how they would apply this value to their life. 7. Give examples of how they can imitate Christ. 8. Identify Jesus’ life and teachings as portrayed in Sacred Scripture. 2. Know that the life of Jesus is the fulfillment of salvation history as foretold in the Old Testament (Jewish Scripture). 3. Understand the relevance of the Gospel as a whole to Christian Life. 4. Recognize mysteries of the Rosary as a compendium of the life of Christ. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 5. Read, study & discuss Old and New Testaments. 6. Identify and discuss the values or virtues expressed in specific Scripture Stories. 7. Locate the life of Jesus as fulfillment of salvation history in relationship to the Old Testament (Jewish Scripture). 8. Read one of the four Gospels in its entirety (beginning to end) according to the Cycle of Readings (A, B, or C). 9. Compare how the life of Jesus is portrayed in each of the four Gospels. 10. Illustrate Bible Stories through drama, art, music, technology, etc. 11. <p><u><i>Knowledge: Students will</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Recognize Mary as Mother of Jesus and Mother of us all. 2. Recognize Mary's love and trust in God by her saying "yes" to God. 3. Know that Mary was born without Original Sin. 4. Be familiar with days the Church honors Mary and saints. 5. Know the importance of the Hail Mary. 6. Recognize the saints and other holy people. 7. Know we are all called to be holy. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 8. Learn and say the Hail Mary. 9. Pray the Rosary together. 10. Identify All Saints Day as a celebration of all people who have lived holy lives. 11. Identify All Souls Day as a celebration of all people who have died. 12. Illustrate how Mary and the saints are models in our call to be holy through drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u><i>Life Application: Students will</i></u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Begin to develop devotion to Mary and to the saints in their personal prayer life. • Celebrate with family the special days honoring Mary and the saints. 	<p><u><i>Knowledge: Students will</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Recognize Mary as model of Christian discipleship. 2. Recognize how different cultures, both past and present, honor Mary. 3. Know Mary's holy days. 4. Be familiar with the communion of saints and be able to recognize saints as models of discipleship. 5. Recognize faith in action in the lives of Mary, in the saints, and in members of the Church. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 6. Pray the Rosary and other Marian devotions. 7. Define the communion of saints. 8. Report on a patron saint or another saint. 9. Illustrate the lives of Mary and the saints as models of discipleship using drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u><i>Life Application: Students will</i></u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Accept the example of Mary and of the saints as models for daily living. • Continue to develop devotion to Mary and to the saints in their personal prayer life. • Celebrate with family the special days honoring Mary and the saints. 	<p><u><i>Knowledge: Students will</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know the Church's teachings about Mary the Mother of God and appreciate her role in the Church. 2. Recognize the feasts of Mary, what they celebrate and their meaning in the Church. 3. Explain the qualities and virtues of Mary and of the saints and identify them as role models. 9. Recognize that the Pope is the leader of today’s Church. 5. Know that each baptized person is called to follow Jesus. 6. Know the Church is a community of believers called to follow Jesus. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 7. Tell others about God. 8. Practice helping others. 9. Be a good example to family and to friends. 10. Give examples of people who help others. 11. Understand the role of Tradition in the Church. 4. Know that our Tradition includes various forms of prayer and of devotion. 5. Be familiar with current structure of the Church and with the roles within the community. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 6. Appreciate and share Catholic Tradition, beliefs and heritage. 7. Connect values of early Christian community with contemporary issues. 8. Compare/contrast general family traditions with Tradition of the Church. 9. Illustrate the origin, Tradition and mission of the Church using drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u><i>Life Application: Students will</i></u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Spread the Gospel message by joyfully sharing our faith and our practices with others. 	<p><u><i>Knowledge: Students will</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Be familiar with the origin of the Church as told in the Acts of the Apostles. 2. Know that Tradition comes from the apostles who handed on what they received from Jesus and what they learned from the Holy Spirit (CCC 83). 3. Know that all we believe, “Deposit of Faith” is contained in Scripture and Tradition, and is the source of current Church teaching (CCC 84). 4. Understand the relationship of the early Church to Scripture. 5. Know the current structure and governance of the Church and the responsibilities of all baptized. <p><u><i>Skill: Students will be able to</i></u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 6. Explain the Tradition of the Church as celebrated in liturgical seasons: waiting, rejoicing, repenting, celebrating and growing. 7. Describe the development of the early Church. 8. Relate their lives to Catholic teachings. 9. Standard A: Recognize and participate in the Catholic Church’s liturgical life as a means to encounter Christ in its feasts, seasons, symbols, practices, and prayers.

Outcome (Being): Students will become persons who are growing in understanding the Paschal Mystery through meditation on the Gospel and through sharing in the Eucharist in order to go forth to love and serve the Lord. (RCIA, 244)

As a result of their faith formation ...

<p><u>Knowledge: Students will</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know the seasons of the Church year, i.e. Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Ordinary Time. 2. Know that the Sunday Mass is the central focus of the celebration of the liturgical year. 3. Know that the Mass is prayer. 4. Know that Catholics celebrate using symbols, actions, gestures, music, etc. 5. Be familiar with items used in Liturgy and begin to understand reverence due them. <p><u>Skill: Students will be able to</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 6. Identify the colors of the liturgical seasons. 7. Identify articles used in worship, for example, altar, ambo, Paschal candle, tabernacle, presider’s chair, baptismal font, Stations of the Cross, statues, art work, etc. 8. Experience a classroom prayer center that reflects the liturgical season. 9. Illustrate the Church year and items used in worship using drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u>Life Application: Students will</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Actively participate with family in weekend liturgy throughout the year. • Demonstrate etiquette and reverence in Church. 	<p><u>Knowledge: Students will</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know liturgical calendar and its: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Connection to life of Christ b. Connection to Lectionary c. Order of the seasons 2. Know that Sunday is the principal day for celebration of Eucharist. 3. Know the symbols, practices, and celebrations (including cultural celebrations) of the liturgical year. 4. Know the different parts of the Mass: Liturgy of Word and Liturgy of Eucharist. <p><u>Skill: Students will be able to</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 5. Use prayer, reflection, ritual, and community worship to celebrate an awareness of God’s presence in their life. 6. Participate in various liturgical roles, including the Assembly. 7. Design, prepare, set-up a classroom prayer center to reflect liturgical season. 8. Reflect on their experiences of liturgical celebrations using the senses, i.e. what you hear, what you see, what you smell, etc. (Mystagogia). 9. Learn proper terminology for all parts of the Mass, e.g. Greeting, Gloria, Gospel Acclamation, etc 6. Discuss the format and the use of the Lectionary. <p><u>Life Application: Students will</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Actively participate with family in weekend liturgy and begin to assume various liturgical roles. • Continue to demonstrate etiquette and reverence while actively participating in liturgical celebration.

Standard B: Comprehend that sacraments are an outward sign of God’s Love having the power to transform our lives.

Outcome (Being): Students will become persons who are growing in understanding the Paschal Mystery through meditation on the Gospel and through sharing in the Eucharist in order to go forth to love and serve the Lord. (RCIA, 244)

As a result of their faith formation ...

<p><u>Knowledge: Students will</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know there are seven sacraments. 2. Learn about Baptism, Reconciliation and Eucharist 3. Know the sacraments are a community celebration. 4. Know sacraments are signs of God’s Love. 5. Know a ritual action of each of these three sacraments. 6. Know Baptism welcomes them into the family of God. 7. Know Reconciliation as the gift of God’s forgiveness. 8. Understand that we need the gift of God’s forgiveness. 9. Know that Jesus is present in the Eucharist. <p><u>Skill: Students will be able to</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 10. Recite an Act of Contrition. 11. Illustrate an understanding of how God’s love is shown through Baptism, Reconciliation and Eucharist through drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u>Life Application: Students will</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Participate in the celebration of the sacraments. • Share stories about family member’s experiences of the sacraments. 	<p><u>Knowledge: Students will</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know the seven sacraments as sacraments of initiation, vocation and healing. 2. Know symbols and signs for each sacrament. 3. Know how God’s love and saving power is celebrated and is received in each of the seven sacraments. 4. Understand that the sacraments are a community celebration. 5. Know the proper disposition for receiving the sacraments (CCC1128). <p><u>Skill: Students will be able to</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 6. Reflect on and express their experiences of sacrament celebrations. 7. Explain why the celebration of the sacraments is a sign of God’s loving presence and saving power. 8. Illustrate an understanding of how God’s love is shown through the seven sacraments using drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u>Life Application: Students will</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Participate in the celebration of the sacraments. • Share stories about family member’s experiences of the sacraments. 	<p><u>Knowledge: Students will</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Know the: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Definitions, signs, and symbols of the seven sacraments b. Proper ministers of the seven sacraments c. Proper disposition for receiving the seven sacraments. 2. Know the Biblical origin and spiritual significance of the seven sacraments. 3. Recognize that the sacraments celebrate the presence of God’s grace in our lives. 4. Recognize that in Confirmation the Holy Spirit brings us into a deeper relationship with Christ, with the Church, and with the mission of the Church. 5. Recognize that in Confirmation the Holy Spirit helps us to bear witness to our faith. 6. Explain the ritual action and the proper minister(s) for each sacrament. 8. Explain why Catholics celebrate the sacraments and illustrate how each sacrament is a sign of God’s living presence. 9. Research and examine the lives of people who have experienced how the power of the sacraments have transformed their lives. 10. Reflect on their experience of the sacrament celebrations and express these experiences using their senses. 11. Illustrate an understanding of how God’s love is shown through the seven sacraments, especially Confirmation using drama, art, music, technology etc. <p><u>Life Application: Students will</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Participate in the celebration of the sacraments. • Share stories about family member’s experiences of the sacraments and what it means for them as an individual. • Experience the call to discipleship and imitate Christ so that others may see Christ in their actions.

Outcome (Being): Students will become persons who are growing in understanding the Paschal Mystery through meditation on the Gospel and through sharing in the Eucharist in order to go forth to love and serve the Lord. (RCIA, 244)

As a result of their faith formation ...

<p><u>Knowledge: Students will</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Recognize the Eucharist (Mass) as the most important celebration of our Catholic Faith Community. 2. Know Jesus gave us the Eucharist at the Last Supper. 3. Know that bread/wine are changed into the Body/Blood of Jesus. 4. Know that Eucharist means “to give thanks.” <p><u>Skill: Students will be able to</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 5. Define Eucharist in an age-appropriate manner. 6. Illustrate an understanding of the Eucharist using drama, art, music, technology, etc. <p><u>Life Application: Students will</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Participate in the Eucharist (Sunday Mass) with family and with community. • Express appreciation for Jesus’ gift to us by being kind and by being generous to others. 	<p><u>Knowledge: Students will</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Appreciate the Eucharist (Mass) as the most important celebration of our Catholic Faith Community. 2. Know that Eucharist is the memorial and making present of Christ’s Passover, the work of salvation accomplished by the life, death and resurrection of Christ. 3. Know and believe that through the power of the Holy Spirit, the bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Jesus, and that Jesus is truly present. 4.
